If You Look Hard Enough, You Can See Our Future: Selections of Contemporary South African Art from the Nando's Art Collection

Future is the eagerly anticipated contemporary art exhibition making its debut at the African American Museum in Dallas in April 2023.

Organized by Dallas-based curator Laurie Ann Farrell along with support from The Spier Arts Trust in South Africa, this exhibition highlights more than 50 artists and 68 artworks selected from the Nando's Art Collection in South Africa, the United States, and the United Kingdom. While individual works have been exhibited globally, this is the first time audiences in the United States will have the opportunity to experience a curated exhibition of masterworks from the Nando's Art Collection.

If You Look Hard Enough, You Can See Our Future encourages viewers to explore the

exhibition's multi-generational views on South African life as seen through portraiture, depictions of place, and abstraction. These artistic perspectives, both real and imagined, help shape an understanding of the South African milieu and its transformation over the last eighty years. Viewers will be immersed in the collections' distinct South African aesthetics, while also engaging with universal themes such as love, loss and the hope for a better future.

Heightened attention towards contemporary African art, from museums and art markets, has primed US audiences for the many artistic discoveries this exhibition brings to bear. If You Look Hard Enough features paintings, photographs, sculptures and mixed-media works from the world's largest and most diverse collection of South African art. The scope of the exhibit is unparalleled: works span the last seventy years, with pieces from 1948 in dialogue with featured works created by emerging artists as recently as 2022. The exhibition introduces dozens of exciting new artists alongside select mid-career and established artists, encompassing the best of the past and heralding a vibrant future. Museum visitors will revel in this rare opportunity to experience highlights from this collection in their own cities.
